Westwood Manor CH-151 Charles County, MD Allen's Fresh vic. Private

Westwood Manor is a 1 ½ story Flemish bond brick structure with a gambrel roof situated on 30 acres overlooking Allen's Fresh at the headwaters of the Wicomico River. The dwelling is believed to have been built for John Winter after 1739 and extensively remodeled in the Greek Revival-style during the mid-19th century. By the mid-20th century, the house was abandoned and in a state of disrepair. In 1963, the site was completely renovated by it's current owner. At this time, a frame Victorian wing that stood on the east elevation was demolished and Victorian-era exterior trim and interior chimney flue were removed. A 1-story gambrel roof kitchen was built in place of the former Victorian wing. The dwelling has a cedar shingle roof and a paved watertable.

Westwood Manor uniquely represents the changing architectural tastes of Charles

Countians during the 18th and 19th centuries. Westwood Manor is one of only two known brick

18th century gambrel roof structures to survive in Charles County. Black Friars (CH-42), located nearby on the opposite side of the Wicomico is a similar brick example believed to date from the mid 18th century. The historic setting, on a high bluff overlooking cultivated fields leading to Allen's Fresh, adds to the site's significance.

Westwood Manor is a 1 1/2 story Flemish bond brick structure with a gambrel roof situated on 30 acres overlooking Allen's Fresh at the headwaters of the Wicomico River. The dwelling is believed to have been built for John Winter after 1739 and extensively remodeled in the Greek Revival style during the mid-19th century. By the mid-20th century the house was abandoned and in a state of disrepair. In 1963, the site was completely renovated by it's current owner. At this time a frame Victorian wing that stood on the east elevation was demolished and Victorian-era exterior trim and interior chimney flue were removed. A 1-story gambrel roof kitchen was built in place of the former Victorian wing. The dwelling has a cedar shingle roof and a paved watertable.

The dwelling faces south and includes a five bay first floor front elevation sheltered by a shed roof porch supported by five solid wood Ionic columns. Four pedimented dormers pierce the roof. The current doorway occupies the second bay. Windows on this as well as the opposite elevation are 6/6 wood sash.

The west gable end includes a two-story porch with four staved first and second story Ionic columns. This elevation has a stucco-over-brick finish. Single offset exterior doors are found on this elevation. The northwest elevation includes three existing first floor bays along with evidence of a previous door and window that were bricked in during the mid-19th century renovation.

The interior was completely gutted at the time of the 1963 renovation with the exception of the Greek Revival stair that features a massive turned and reeded newel. A mid-19th century hand-grained wood door also survives and has been preserved and reused in the kitchen addition.

The restoration of the dwelling and the existing conditions at the time were accurately recorded by Louise Boone Turner in her thesis entitled "A Maryland Manor in Transition". Although many details that might reveal the architectural evolution of the structure are obscured by finished surfaces, Turner recorded many details regarding construction including the presence of a tilted false plate secured with locust pins. Westwood Manor was first patented in 1651 by Thomas Gerard, but the existing structure is believed to have been erected in 1739 for John Winter. In the mid-19th century the dwelling was expanded and updated in the Greek Revival style presumably by members of the Jameson family. Despite substantial alterations both in the 19th and 20th centuries, Westwood Manor remains one of a few surviving examples of the regionally distinctive room behind room plan found in Charles County during the 18th century. A notable example constructed with a wood frame rather than brick is the Exchange CH-299 NRE. Black Friars CH-42, located nearby on the opposite side of the Wicomico is a similar brick example. The well-preserved historic setting, on a high bluff overlooking cultivated fields leading to Allen's Fresh, adds to the site's significance.





CH-151 WESTWOOD MANOR CHARLES (O, MD 8/2002 CHARDY MIHP SOUTH ELEVATION




CH-151 Westwood Manor Chorles Co, MD 812002 C. Hordy MIHP WEST ELEVATION ZOPE



This manor was granted to Sir Thomas Gerard in 1651. Although records refer to the members of the Gerard family as residing at Westwood Manor, the main section of the present structure is believed to have been built by John Winter, who acquired the property in 1739. It is possible that an earlier structure was incorporated.

The brick main house is of one-story height beneath a broad gambrel roof with dormers. Enclosed within the west gable wall is a single chimney. The existing east exterior chimney is a total reconstruction. The floor plan consists of two front rooms, a rear stair hall, and a room on the back. The interior woodwork on the first floor displays dentil moldings projecting beneath the cornices over the windows and doors.

The most distinctive exterior feature is the west end which is stuccoed and possesses a galleried Federal porch of delicate proportions and detail. The north and south brick walls are of Flemish bond pattern with salt glazed headers.

A servant's quarter is near the main house. It is frame and consists of a single room downstairs with a fireplace. A narrow enclosed stairway leads to an upstairs room with no windows. An exterior chimney is constructed mostly of pieces of brick.



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
